## UPDATE ABOUT THE FARM MUSEUM

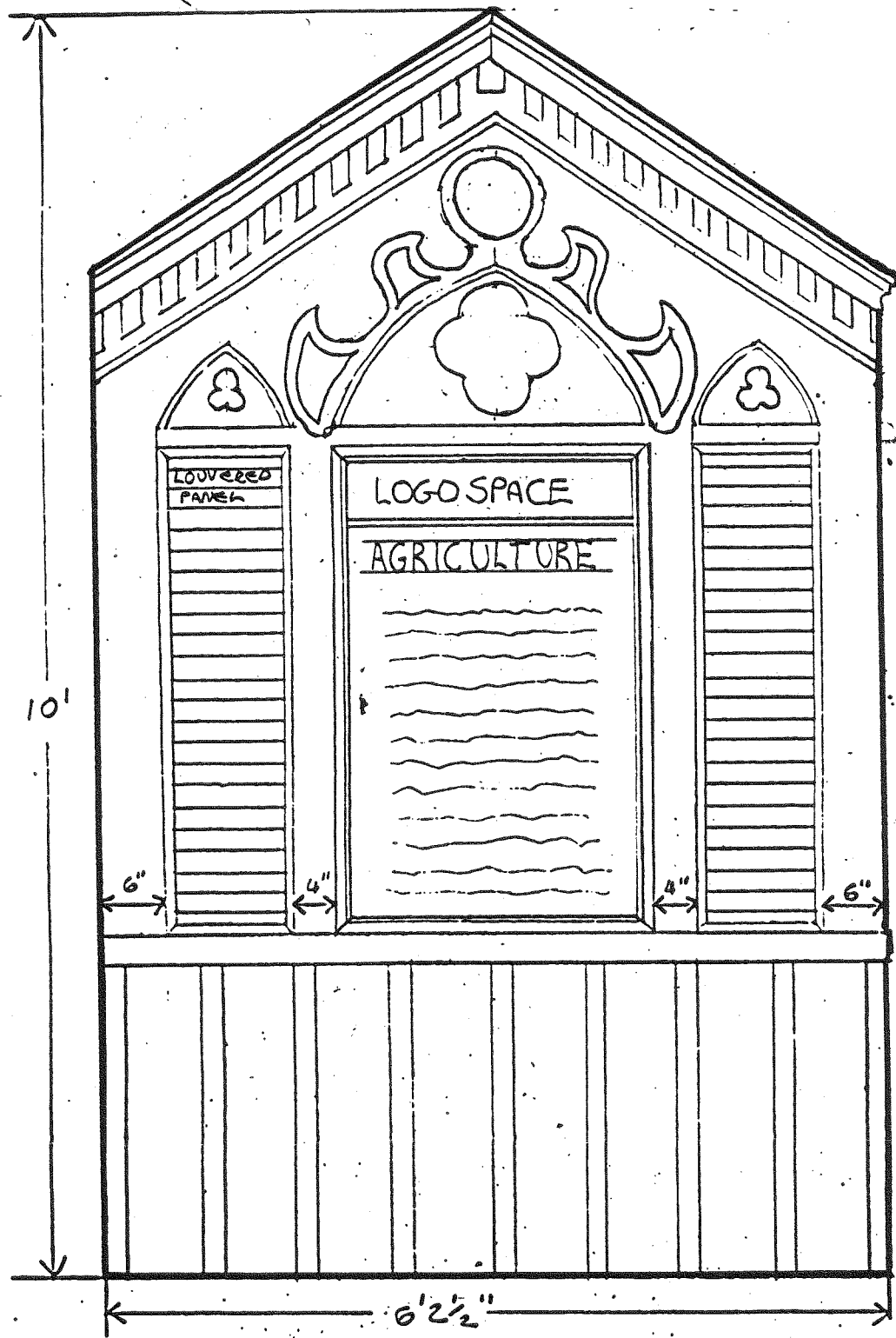
Since the last issue of the News-  
letter, Mr. Trescott, former consultant  
for the project, has suggested in a  
telephone call that he might be willing  
to complete the project under certain  
conditions. For example, his fee for  
the first hour of each day on the job  
would be increased from \$30 to \$75,  
plus \$45 each succeeding hour. He  
wants a week's pay in advance before  
starting to work. He wants a guarantee  
that he will have the sole supervision  
of the project to completion according  
to his design. He will not consent to  
any other supervisor because the  
finished project might not reflect  
favorably on his professional  
reputation.

In case Mr. Trescott is not awarded  
a contract to complete the project, he  
should be required to furnish and  
install several items of millwork that,  
surprisingly, have already been paid  
for as invoiced by him and certified  
for payment last August by the then  
president of the Historical Society,

He should also furnish texts and  
captions for signs and pictures. He  
has already been paid several thousand  
dollars for the hours he spent on texts  
and captions as invoiced by him last  
summer.

## DIRECTOR
